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

Science Returns to the Ausable River

An exciting new addition to AsRA's work is the establishment of a monitoring and research program. With Title 11 funds from the New York State Department of State, AsRA has been able to purchase a multi-parameter probe and temperature loggers, fund two long-term remote monitoring stations on the Chubb River, and regularly monitor several lakes in the watershed.

At the core of this work is a watershed wide bi-weekly monitoring program of the river and its tributaries. At each monitoring location temperature, dissolved oxygen, conductivity, and pH are measured. These basic parameters will help inform and target future water quality monitoring, while also providing critical data on the health of the river and its ability to support aquatic life.



Temperature and dissolved oxygen (DO) profiles of Mirror Lake on May 18th, 2015. The spike in DO near the thermocline is likely the result of an algae bloom which is typical during this time of year.

Water temperature is of particular concern.

Warmer water stresses cold-water fish species and can't dissolve as much oxygen. This summer we will be placing 13 temperature loggers in the river and several tributaries to assess the ability of these streams to support fish, particularly brook trout.

Chloride pollution from the application of road salt to area roads is one of the most significant threats to the water quality of the Ausable River. Our bi-weekly monitoring program allows us to monitor chloride concentrations in the river by modeling its relationship with conductivity. To develop a better understanding of how this pollutant is moving through our watershed we have partnered with the Adirondack Watershed Institute to place two long-term remote monitoring stations on the Chubb River. These stations will allow us to monitor the impact winter road maintenance practices in Lake Placid are having on the Chubb River. The Adirondack Watershed Institute will be processing water samples from these stations on a bi-weekly basis, which will also alert us to other

pollutants such as phosphorus.

Finally with financial assistance

Finally, with financial assistance from the New York State Department of State, the Mirror Lake Watershed Association, and the Town of Wilmington, AsRA has enrolled Taylor Pond, Mirror Lake, and Lake Everest in the Adirondack Lake Assessment Program. Once a month, from May through October, we will take vertical profiles of temperature, dissolved oxygen, conductivity, and pH, as well as measure transparency, and collect water samples to be processed at the Adirondack Watershed Institute.

These programs will help inform and prioritize our work on the Ausable, while also providing valuable information about the river to residents, government leaders, and scientists.

2014 In Review



Palmer Brook Culvert Retrofit

AsRA retrofitted two stream crossings on Palmer Brook. The undersized culverts had created deep scour pools and up to 3 foot water drops at their outlets – exacerbating flooding and cutting off passage for fish. Working with the Town of Black Brook, The Nature Conservancy, and the US Fish and Wildlife Service, a series of natural step pools were constructed to reestablish the connection between the stream and the culvert. The end result: happy fish, less erosion, and less maintenance for the town.

West Branch Riparian Planting

After a stream restoration project ends, AsRA does not walk away. We help establish a flourishing riparian buffer. Lush buffers of native river trees and plants, hardy enough to handle floods, ice, and wind are essential to a healthy river corridor. They stabilize banks with dense root systems, absorb an amazing amount of water, are essential habitat for wildlife, and provide cooling shade. Ausable River waters are warming. Riparian buffers as deep as the river is wide can help counteract this trend.



Riverlands Restoration: Before

It might look pretty, but there is a 10' high raw bank under AsRA's Executive Director Kelley Tucker. At moderate flow, the river is flat and glassy, clogged with sediment, with no evident riffles and limited fish habitat.





Replacing Culverts

AsRA is working side by side with Ausable River towns to replace undersized culverts like the one above. In 2014, we began initial geomorphic surveys of priority culverts so replacements will be appropriately sized to ensure public safety and fish passage.

Surveying Streams

Our ability to provide survey expertise was made possible by the generous donations of many individuals who helped us raise funds through Adirondack Gives to purchase a laser level and receiver, stadia rod, cross-section stakes, survey tapes, and more.

River Steward Funding

We did it! AsRA secured 18 months of funding to make our River Steward position year-round thus renewing our commitment to invasive species spread prevention, outreach on and off the river, clean water steward-ship, and pollution prevention.

Riverlands Restoration: After

We restored over 600 linear feet of streambank, narrowing the stream, adding streambed roughness, restoring the banks, halting erosion. Notice the complex bank full of hiding places for fish, insects, birds, and other wildlife.


